**Reporting Period** - January 1, 2014 – December 31, 2014

## General Grant Information

- Information for this report was submitted by 2,332 individual subgrantees for the January 1, 2014 – December 31, 2014 reporting period.
- 45 (1.9%) subgrantees were faith-based organizations.
- 129 (5.5%) subgrantees were culturally-specific community-based organizations.
- 56 (2.4%) subgrantees reported using STOP Program funds for projects that specifically addressed tribal populations.
- Dual programs and Prosecution were the types of organizations most frequently using STOP funds. The following is a complete list of the types of funded organizations:

### Victim Services

During the 12-month reporting period, STOP Program subgrantees provided services to 400,235 victims/survivors<sup>2</sup> of domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking to help them become and remain safe from violence.

- Program unable to provide service due to limited resources/priority-setting
- Conflict of interest
- Services not appropriate for victim/survivor

## S\*T\*O\*P Violence Against Women Formula Grants

Of the 400,235 victims/survivors served during the 12-month reporting period, those who were served or partially served were most likely to be White (54.3%)<sup>4</sup>, Female (89.5%)<sup>5</sup>, and between the ages of 25 and 59 (69.7%)<sup>5</sup>.

### Shelter services

- 20,872 victims and 19,152 family members received a total of 921,692 bed nights in emergency shelter.
- 1,353 victims and 1,113 family members received a total of 164,715 bed nights in transitional housing.

### **Hotline calls**

- 319,711 hotline calls were received from primary victims/survivors.
- A total of 592,592 hotline calls were received.

### **Victim-witness notification/outreach to victims/survivors**

- 170,671 notification/outreach activities were provided to victims/survivors.

### **Protection orders**

- Of the protection orders<sup>9</sup> for which victim services staff provided assistance, 101,036 orders were granted for domestic violence/dating violence victims/survivors; 3,894 orders were granted for sexual assault victims/survivors; and 4,846 orders were granted for stalking victims/survivors.

# Criminal Justice

## Victim/survivor referrals to victim services

- Law enforcement personnel made 35,754 referrals of victims/survivors to governmental victim services and 35,997 referrals to non-governmental victim services.

## Protection orders

- Of the protection orders<sup>11</sup> for which law enforcement staff provided assistance, 19,327 orders were granted for domestic violence/dating violence victims/survivors; 841 orders were granted for stalking victims/survivors; and 401 orders were granted for sexual assault victims/survivors.

### **Victim/survivor referrals to victim services**

- Prosecution personnel made 40,041 referrals of victims/survivors to governmental victim services and 24,945 referrals to non-governmental victim services.

### **Protection orders**

- Of the protection orders<sup>13</sup> for which prosecution staff provided assistance, 28,936 orders were granted for domestic violence/dating violence victims/survivors; 1,527 orders were granted for sexual assault victims/survivors; and 492 orders were granted for stalking victims/survivors.

- Court personnel made 2,063 referrals of victims/survivors to governmental victim services and 2,631 referrals to non-governmental victim services.

### Civil protection orders

- Of the protection orders<sup>14</sup> for which court staff provided assistance, 12,325 orders were granted for domestic violence/dating violence victims/survivors; 1,717 orders were granted for stalking victims/survivors; and 57 orders were granted for sexual assault victims/survivors.

### Criminal protection orders

- 2,906 criminal protection orders were granted by STOP funded courts.
