General Grant Information

- Information for this report was submitted by 2,327 individual subgrantees for the January 1, 2006 – December 31, 2006 reporting period.
- 74 (3.2%) subgrantees reported using STOP Program funds for projects that specifically addressed tribal populations.
- Domestic violence program and dual program (sexual assault and domestic violence) were the organizations most frequently using STOP funds. The following is a complete list of the types of funded organizations:¹

Victim Services

During the 12-month reporting period, **STOP** Program subgrantees provided services to 535,566 victims/survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking to help them become and remain safe from violence.

The following were the most common barriers noted by the subgrantees as reasons victims were not served or were only partially served:

- Did not meet eligibility or statutory requirements
- Program reached capacity
- Services not appropriate for victim/survivor
- Program rules not acceptable to victim/survivor

Of the 535,566 victims/survivors served during the 12-month reporting period, those who were served or partially served were most likely to be White (57.7%)³, female (90.2%)⁴, and between the ages of 25 and 59 (63.3%)⁴.

Criminal Justice

The STOP Program promotes a coordinated community approach that includes law enforcement, prosecution, courts, probation, victim services, and public and private community resources. Criminal justice data reported here reflects only those activities supported with STOP Program funds.

Probation

- Number of individual subgrantees using funds for probation: 22 (1% of all subgrantees)

Total number of new and continuing cases: 8,077

- Offenders completing probation without violations: 943 (61.0% of those completing probation)
- Offenders completing probation with violations: 602 (39.0%)

Offender Monitoring

Probation officers monitor offenders to review progress and compliance with court orders. Probation officers may meet with offenders in person, by telephone, or via unscheduled surveillance.

- 5,818 offenders received 23,462 face-to-face contacts
- 3,445 offenders received 13,615 telephone contacts
- 1,993 offenders received 5,193 unscheduled surveillance contacts

In addition to offender monitoring, probation officers also contact victims as an additional strategy to increase victim safety.

- 3,832 victims received 6,149 contacts
