Consolidated Grant Program to Address Children and Youth Experiencing Domestic and Sexual Assault and Engage Men and Boys as Allies

July – December 2016

Consolidated Youth Program funds are used to develop, expand, and strengthen prevention strategies and intervention services that target children, youth, and young adults who are victims of and/or exposed to sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking, including support for non-abusing parents and caretakers. They are also used to develop, maintain, or enhance programs that work with men to prevent sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, or stalking by helping men serve as role models and social influencers of other men and youth at the individual, school, or community levels.^{1,2}

- **55** grantees reported this period.

VICTIM SERVICES

Consolidated Youth Program grantees provided services to **938** child/youth victims and **1,395** children/youth indirectly exposed to domestic/sexual violence to help them become and remain safe from violence.

CHILD/YOUTH VICTIMS SERVED

Services to child/youth victims:

- Child advocacy was provided to **463** child/youth victims (49% of all child/youth victims receiving services);
- Counseling services were provided to **393** (42%) child/youth victims;
- Crisis intervention was provided to **255** (27%) child/youth victims;
- Education advocacy was provided to **142** (15%) child/youth victims;
- Transportation was provided to **88** (9%) child/youth victims;
- Criminal justice advocacy/court accompaniment was provided to **66** (7%) child/youth victims;
- Parent-child counseling or treatment intervention was provided to **64** (7%) child/youth victims
- Civil legal advocacy/court accompaniment was provided to **29** (3%) child/youth victims;
- Hospital/clinic/other medical response was provided to **22** (2%) child/youth victims; and
- Language services were provided to **7** (1%) child/youth victims.

Child/youth victims served by type of victimization:

- Sexual assault: **522** (56% of all child/youth victims receiving services)
- Dating violence: **205** (22%)
- Domestic violence: **196** (21%)
- Stalking: **15** (2%)

INDIRECTLY EXPOSED CHILDREN/YOUTH SERVED

Services to children/youth indirectly exposed:

- Child advocacy was provided to **913** to children/youth indirectly exposed (65% of all indirectly exposed children/youth receiving services);
- Counseling services were provided to **553** (40%) children/youth indirectly exposed;
- Crisis intervention was provided to **504** (36%) children/youth indirectly exposed;
- Education advocacy was provided to **468** (34%) children/youth indirectly exposed;
- Parent-child counseling or treatment intervention was provided to **408** (29%) children/youth indirectly exposed;
- Transportation was provided to **169** (12%) children/youth indirectly exposed;
- Language services were provided to **151** (11%) children/youth indirectly exposed;
- Criminal justice advocacy/court accompaniment was provided to **74** (5%) children/youth indirectly exposed;

- Civil legal advocacy/court accompaniment was provided to **48** (3%) children/youth indirectly exposed; and
- Hospital/clinic/other medical response was provided to **2** (<1%) children/youth indirectly exposed.

SUPPORT FOR NON-ABUSING PARENTS/CAREGIVERS

Grantees provide support services and referrals to non-abusing parents/caregivers of child victims and children indirectly exposed to violence. Grantees may either provide these services directly, or refer parents to other agencies.

Non-abusing parents/caregivers receiving support or referrals:

- **329** received support, and
- **389** received referrals.

- **81** non-abusing parents/caregivers and **125** accompanying family members received a total of **2,642** emergency shelter bed nights.

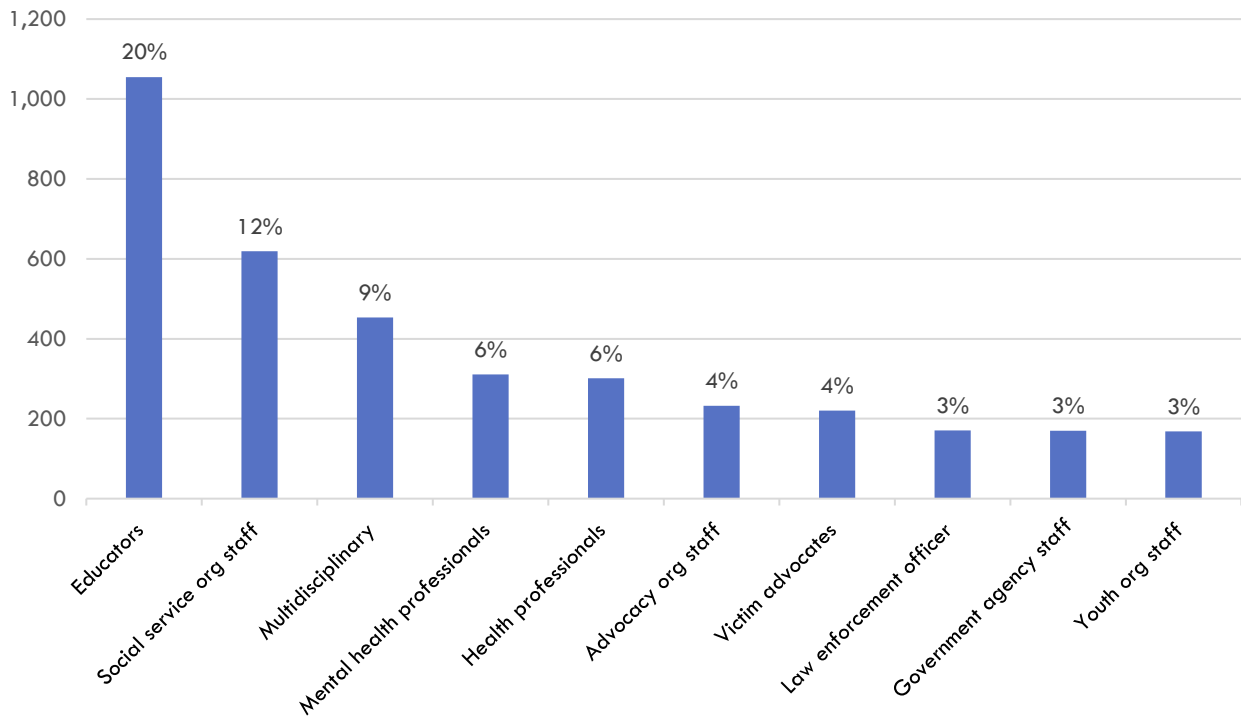
TRAINING

Grantees provide training for professionals so that they can improve the identification of and response to children exposed to domestic/sexual violence. This training improves the professional response to victims and increases offender accountability.

- **29** grantees used funds for training (53% of all grantees reporting).
- **5,263** professionals¹³ attended **242** training events.

STAFF

Grant-funded staff provide training to professionals who work with children; training and public education to engage men and youth in ending violence; and victim services to child victims and children indirectly exposed to domestic/sexual violence.

- **48** grantees used funds for staff (87% of all grantees reporting).
- **116** full-time equivalent (FTE) staff were funded this period.

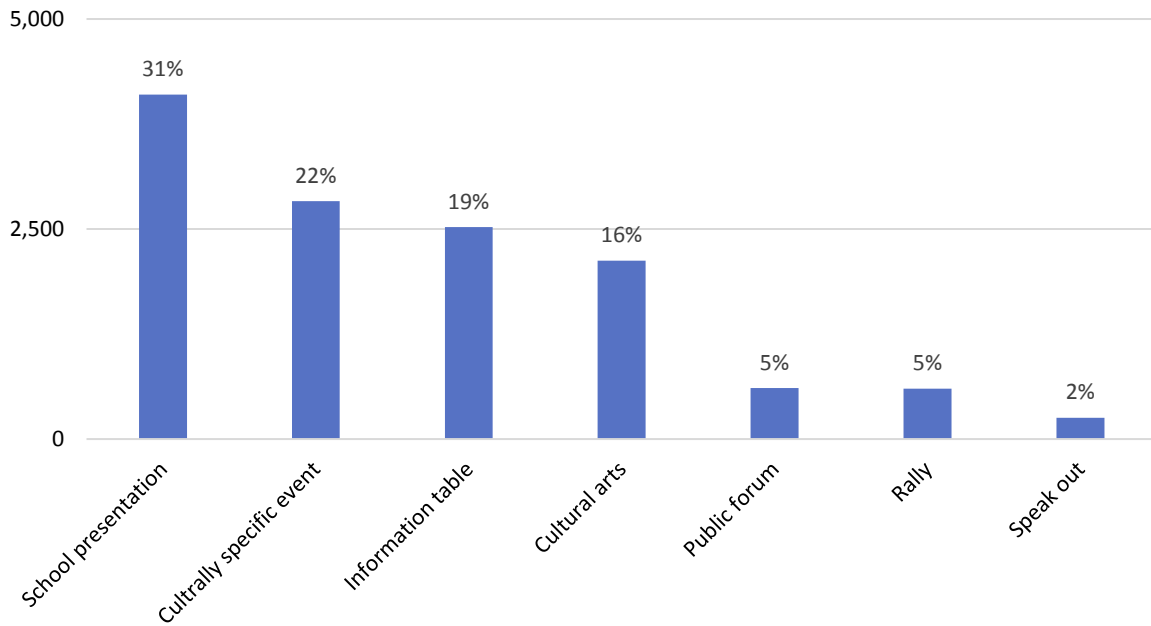
COMMUNITY ORGANIZING/MOBILIZATION AND PREVENTION

Grantees assist in community organizing and mobilization, encouraging men and boys to work as allies to prevent physical and/or sexual violence and build safe, supportive, and accountable communities.

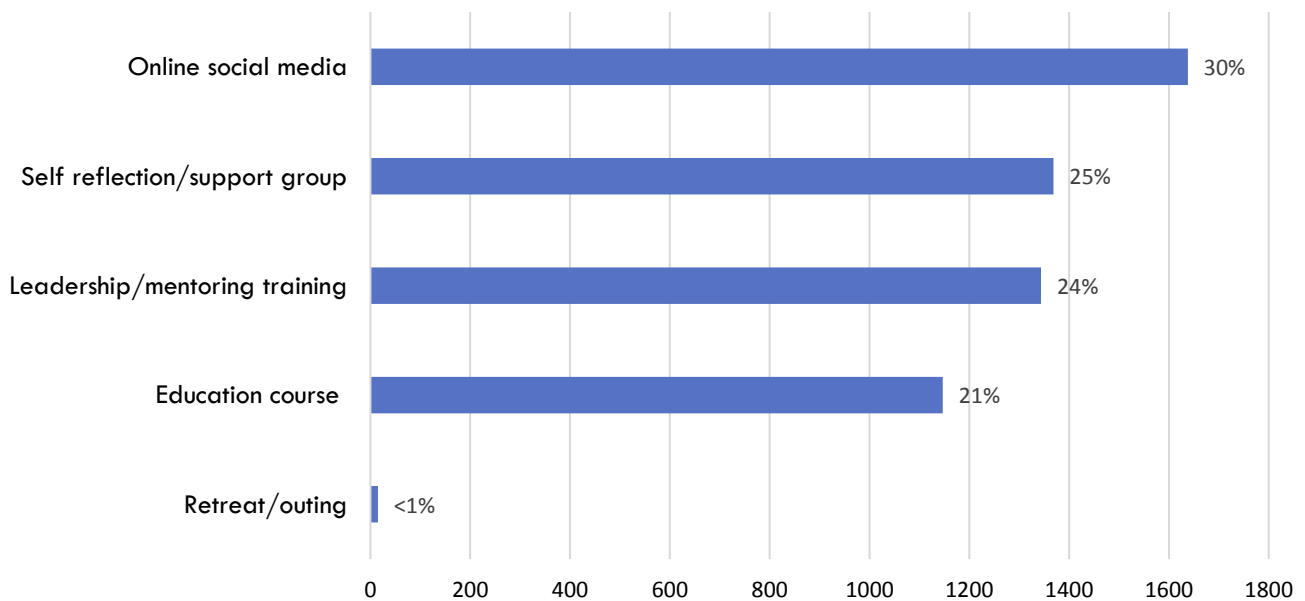
- **13** grantees used funds for community organizing/mobilization and prevention (24% of all grantees reporting).
 - **13,143** people attended **129** community events.
- **75** ongoing (multi-session) community activities were provided.
 - **5,513** people were reached through ongoing (multi-session) activities.

People attending community events¹⁵



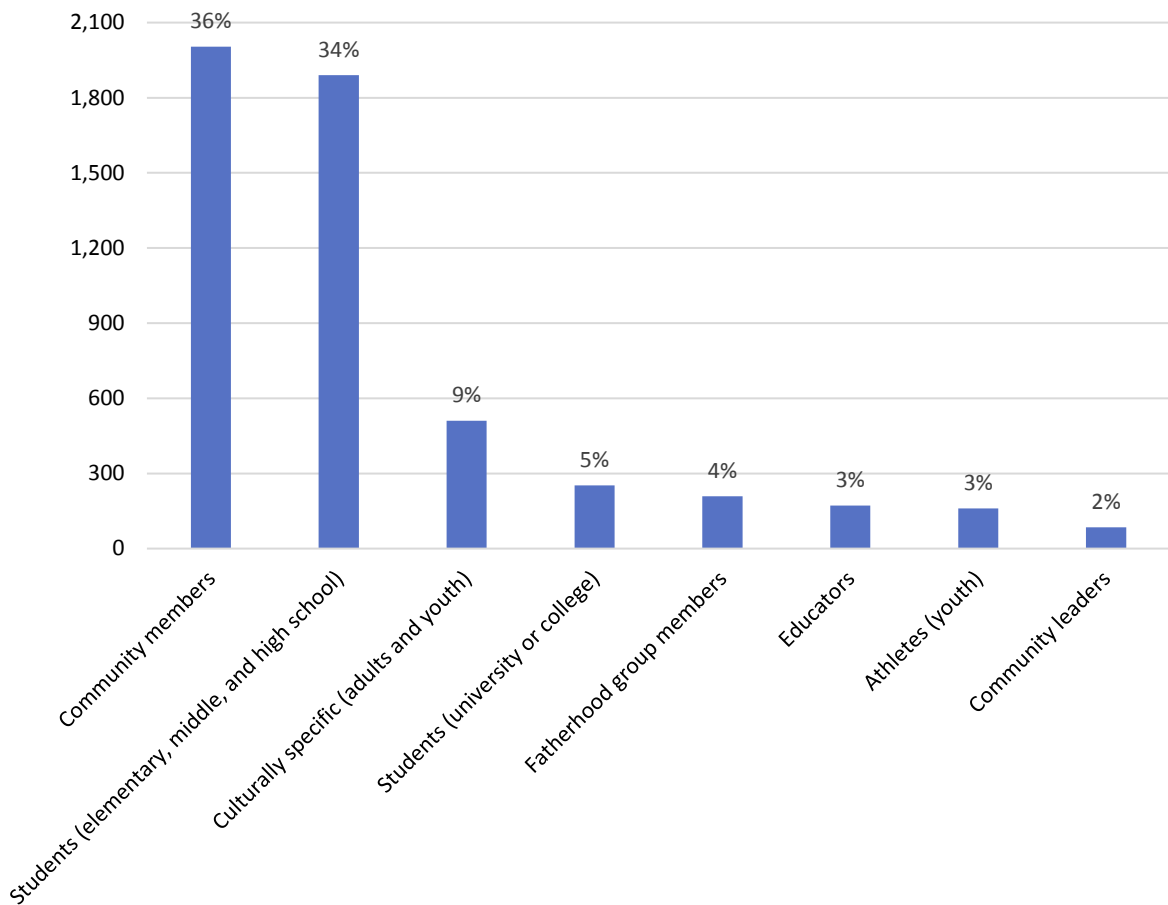
Ongoing activities most frequently attended¹⁶

PUBLIC EDUCATION/AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

Grantees create public education campaigns encouraging men and boys to work as allies with women and girls to prevent domestic/sexual violence.

- **9** grantees used funds for education/awareness campaigns (16% of all grantees reporting).
- **53** public awareness campaigns were supported with grant funding.

Types of public education/awareness campaigns most frequently reported by grantees:

- Online social media;
- Print;
- Media articles;
- Poster campaigns;
- Merchandizing; and
- Web-based video/internet advertisements.

Intended audiences of public education campaigns most frequently reported by grantees:¹⁷

- Fathers/father-figures/caregivers;
- Black or African American;
- High school students;
- Athletes;
- Coaches;
- Middle school students;
- Live in urban communities;
- Educators; and
- Elementary school students.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

Grantees engage in planning and development activities.

- **2** grantees used funds to provide planning and development (4% of all grantees reporting).
- **6** planning and development meetings were held with **26** people attending.

VOLUNTEER ACTIVITIES

Grantees recruit, train, and utilize volunteers to assist in engaging men and boys to work as allies with women and girls to prevent domestic/sexual violence.

- **6** grantees used funds to recruit volunteers (11% of all grantees reporting).
- **74** volunteers were recruited.
- **51** volunteers were trained.
- **57** volunteers engaged in the following activities:
 - Community organization/mobilization and/or prevention activities: **17** (30% of volunteers)
 - Mentoring: **26** (46%)
 - Public education/awareness campaigns: **12** (21%)
