

## July 1, 2013 – December 31, 2013 Office on Violence Against Women Rural Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, and Stalking Assistance Program (Rural Program)<sup>1</sup>



The purpose of the Rural Program is to enhance the safety of victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, and child sexual abuse by supporting projects uniquely designed to address and prevent these crimes in rural jurisdictions. This program challenges community-based organizations and leaders to collaborate, communicate, identify issues, and share ideas that will result in responses that will ensure victim safety and offender accountability.

Number of grantees reporting 121

**Victim Services:** Rural Program grantees provided services to over **14,500** victims/survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, and child sexual abuse to help them become and remain safe from violence.

Number of grantees using funds for victim services: 96 (79% of all grantees reporting)

**Victim services and demographics:** Rural Program grantees provide an array of services to victims/ survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking and child sexual abuse. These services included victim and child advocacy (actions designed to help the victim/survivor obtain needed resources or services), crisis intervention, and support group/counseling. Victims/survivors receive safety planning, referrals, and information as needed.



**Training:** Rural Program grantees train professionals to improve the response to victims/survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, and child sexual abuse, and to increase offender accountability.





## **Disposition of violations of probation**

Probation officers monitor offenders to review progress and compliance with conditions of probation. The data reported below reflect the sanctions imposed for violations that were disposed of during the current reporting period.

## Offender monitoring

- ◆ 256 offenders received 1,789 face-to-face contacts
- **→ 238** offenders received **634** telephone monitoring contacts
- + 231 offenders received 459 unscheduled surveillance contacts

#### **Outreach to victims/survivors**

In addition to offender monitoring, probation officers also contact victims/survivors as an additional strategy to increase victim/survivor safety.

→ 39 victims/survivors received 51 contacts
