

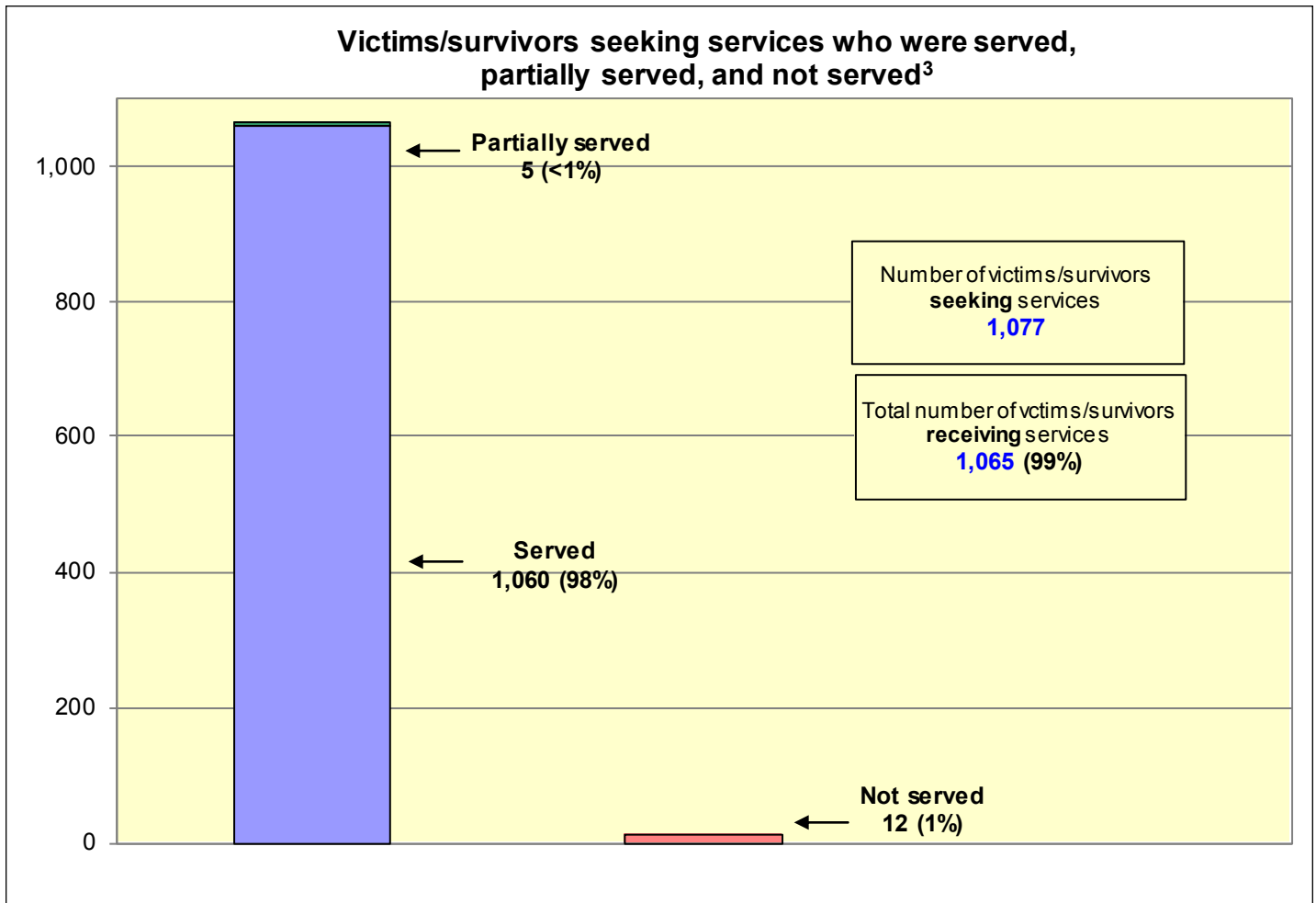

**Sexual Assault Services Culturally
Specific Grant Program
(SASP Culturally Specific
Grant Program)^{1,2}**

The purpose of the SASP Culturally Specific Grant Program is to create, maintain, and expand sustainable sexual assault services provided by culturally specific organizations, which are uniquely situated to respond to the needs of sexual assault victims within culturally specific populations.

Victim Services: SASP Culturally Specific Grant Program grantees provided services to **1,065** victims/survivors of sexual assault to help them become and remain safe from violence.

Victim services and demographics: SASP Culturally Specific Grant Program grantees provide an array of services to victims/survivors of sexual assault including victim advocacy (actions designed to help the victim/survivor obtain needed resources or services), counseling/support group, crisis intervention, and legal advocacy (assistance navigating the criminal and/or legal system). Victims/survivors receive safety planning, referrals, and information as needed.

Number of victims/survivors receiving the following services:

- Victim/survivor advocacy: **736** (69% of those receiving services)
- Crisis intervention: **659** (62%)
- Counseling services/support group: **450** (42%)
- Language services: **120** (11%)
- Transportation: **110** (10%)
- Civil legal advocacy/court accompaniment: **102** (10%)
- Criminal justice advocacy/court accompaniment: **88** (8%)
- Material assistance: **65** (6%)
- Hospital/clinic/other medical response: **41** (4%)
- Financial counseling: **28** (3%)
- Employment counseling: **24** (2%)
- Job training: **3** (<1%)

Number of victims/survivors receiving assistance with Immigration matters:

- U visa: **19** (2% of those receiving services)
- VAWA self-petition: **10** (1%)
- T visa: **3** (<1%)
- Work authorization: **2** (<1%)
- Other immigration matters:⁴ **10** (1%)

Number of hotline calls and requests for information and referral received from victims/survivors:

- Hotline calls: **602**
- Web-based requests: **95**
- Walk-in requests: **131**

- ♦ Female: **924** (96% of those receiving services)
- ♦ Male: **43** (4%)

Race/ethnicity^{5,6}

- ♦ Hispanic or Latino: **286** (32% of those receiving services)
- ♦ Black or African American: **207** (23%)
- ♦ White: **158** (17%)
- ♦ American Indian or Alaska Native: **133** (15%)
- ♦ Asian: **122** (13%)
- ♦ Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander: **1** (<1%)

Relationship to offender⁷

- ♦ Current or former spouse or intimate partner: **595** (54%)
- ♦ Other family member: **279** (25%)
- ♦ Acquaintance: **130** (12%)
- ♦ Stranger: **58** (5%)
- ♦ Dating relationship: **40** (4%)

⁷ Victims/survivors may have been abused by more than one offender, so the total (when unknowns are included) may be higher than the total number of victims/survivors reported as served. Percentages presented here are based on the total number of known relationships.

Staff: SASP Culturally Specific Grant Program staff provide victim services and outreach to increase victim/survivor safety.

Number of grantees using funds for staff: **22** (100% of all grantees reporting)
