General Grant Information

- Information for this report was submitted by 608 subgrantees from 50 states and three territories for the January 1, 2015 – December 31, 2015 reporting period.
- Twelve (2%) subgrantees were faith-based organizations.
- 15 (2.5%) subgrantees reported using SASP Program funds for projects that specifically addressed tribal populations.

- Conflict of interest

Demographics of Victims/survivors served and partially served

Of the 48,691 victims/survivors served during the 12-month reporting period, those who were served or partially served were most likely to be White (58.4%)⁶, female (87.8%)⁷, and between the ages of 25 and 59 (45.6%).⁵
