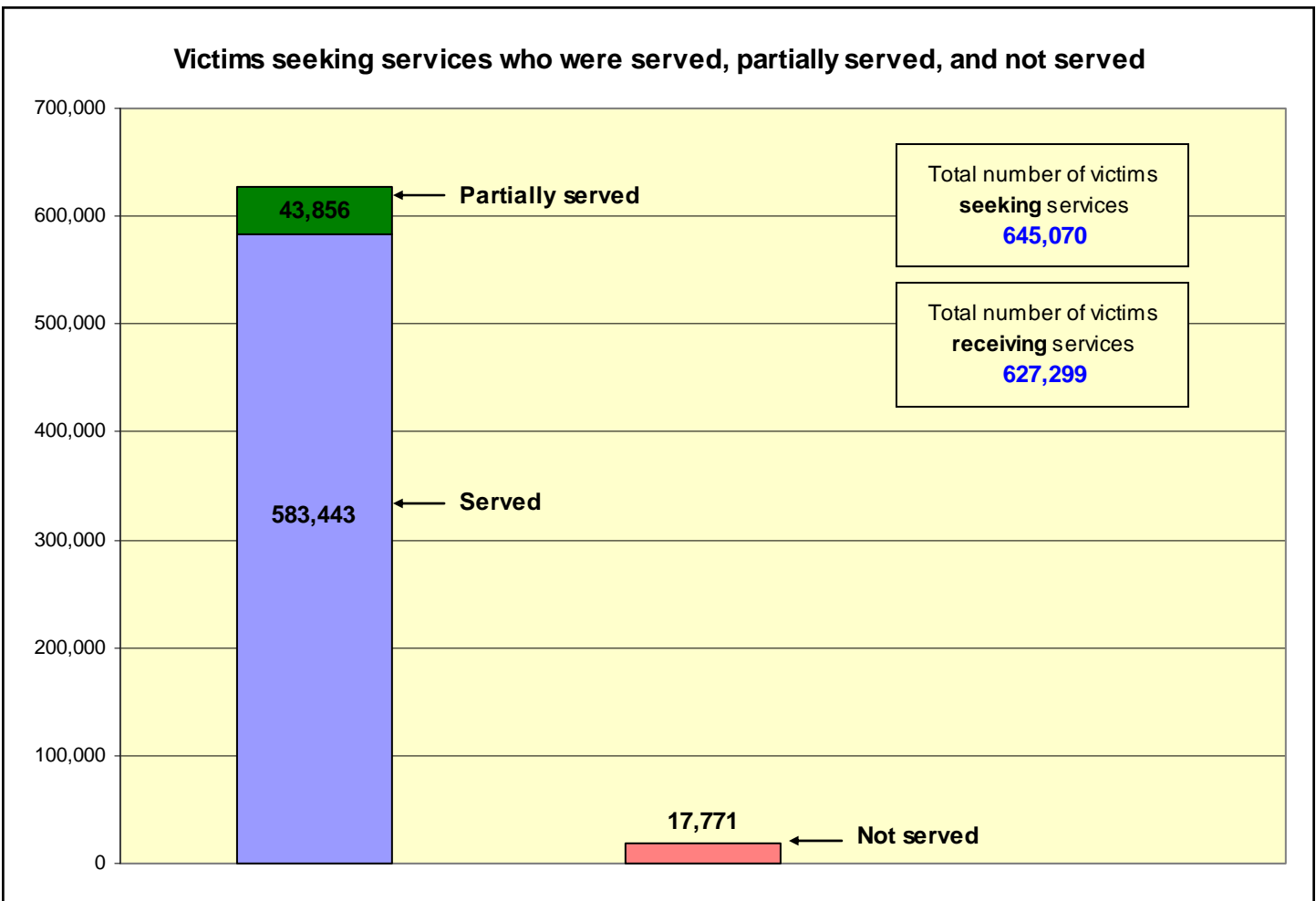

The purpose of the STOP (Services, Training, Officers, and Prosecutors) Violence Against Women Formula Grant Program (STOP Program) is to develop and strengthen the justice system's response to violence against women, and to improve the services available to victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking.

Total number of subgrantees reporting	2,450
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Victim Services: STOP Program subgrantees provided services to over **627,000** victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking to help them become and remain safe from violence.

Total number of subgrantees using funds for victim services: **1,646** (67% of all subgrantees)



Victim services and demographics: STOP Program subgrantees provided an array of services to victims of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking. These services included victim advocacy (actions designed to help the victim/survivor obtain needed resources or services), crisis intervention, and legal advocacy (assistance navigating the criminal and/or civil legal system). Victims receive safety planning, referrals, and information as needed.

Victims served or partially served by type of victimization:

- Domestic violence/dating violence: 527,836 (84% of those receiving services)
- Sexual assault: 85,504 (14%)
- Stalking: 13,959 (2%)

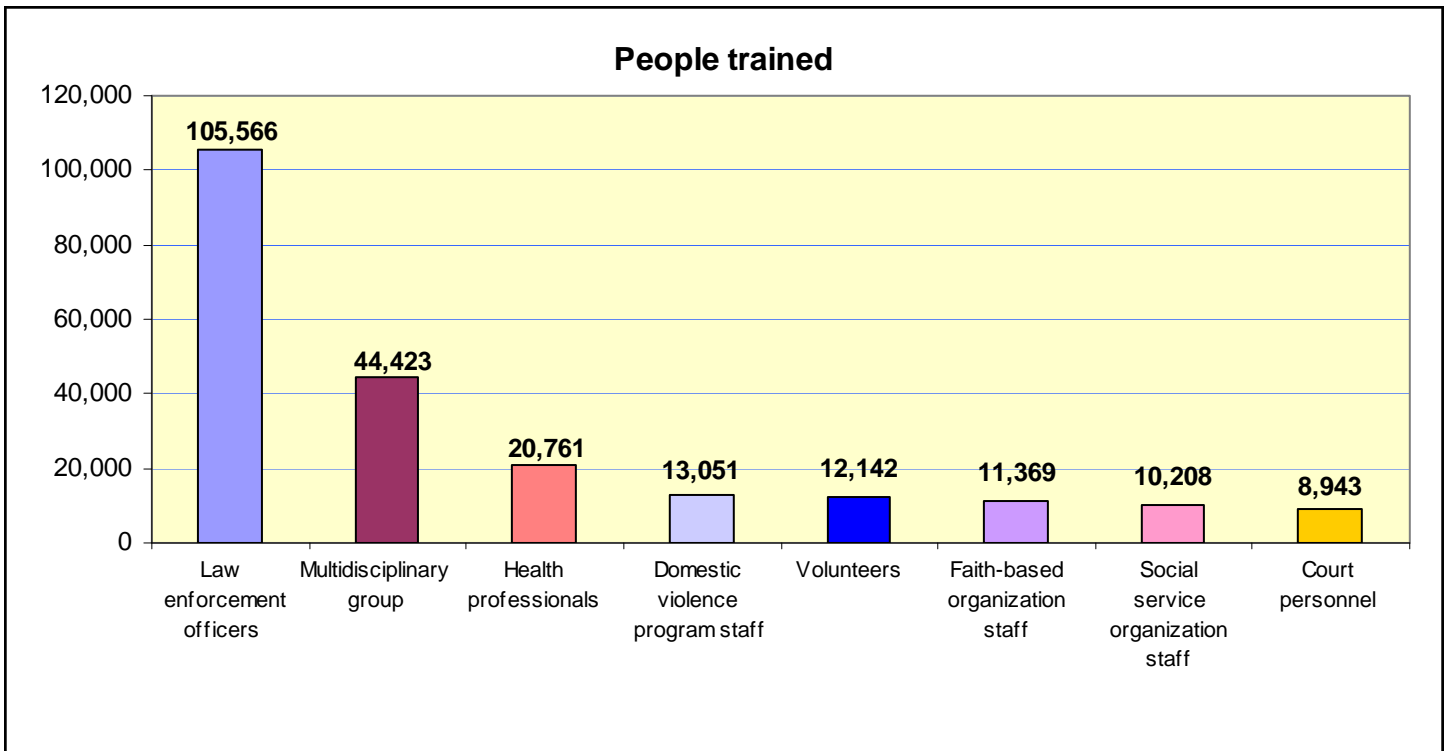

Training: STOP Program subgrantees train professionals to improve the response to victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking and to increase offender accountability.

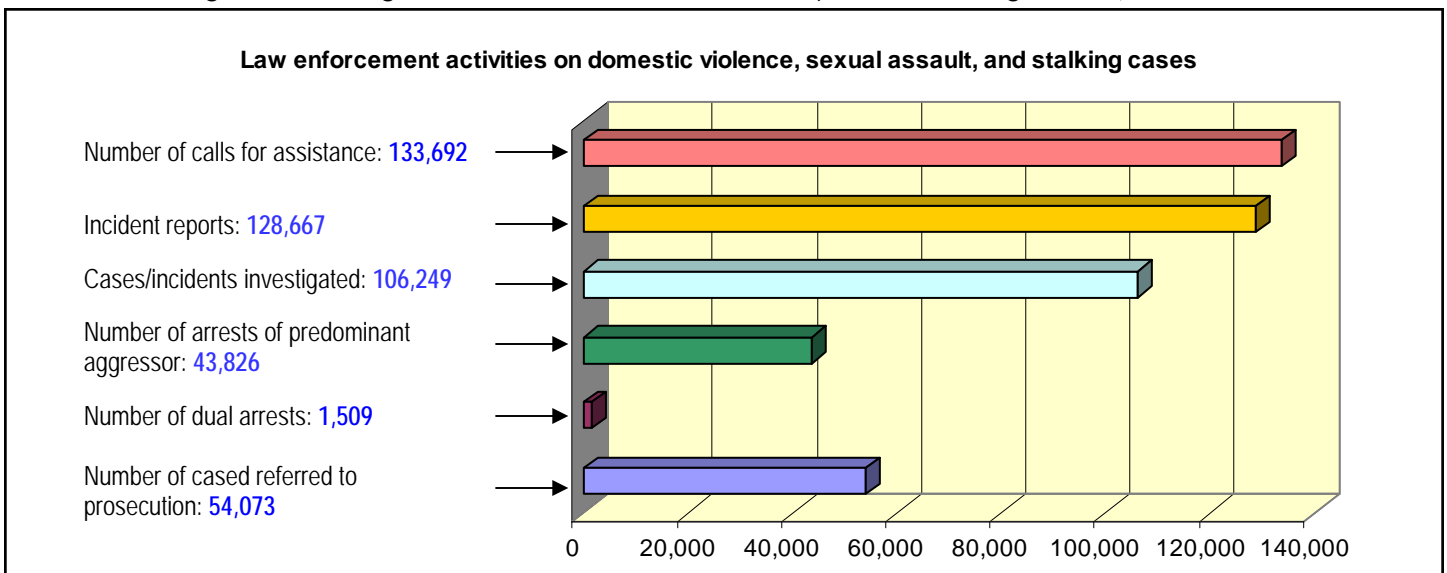
Staff: STOP Program staff provide training, victim services, law enforcement activities, prosecution, court services, supervision of offenders, and batterer intervention programs to increase victim safety and offender accountability.

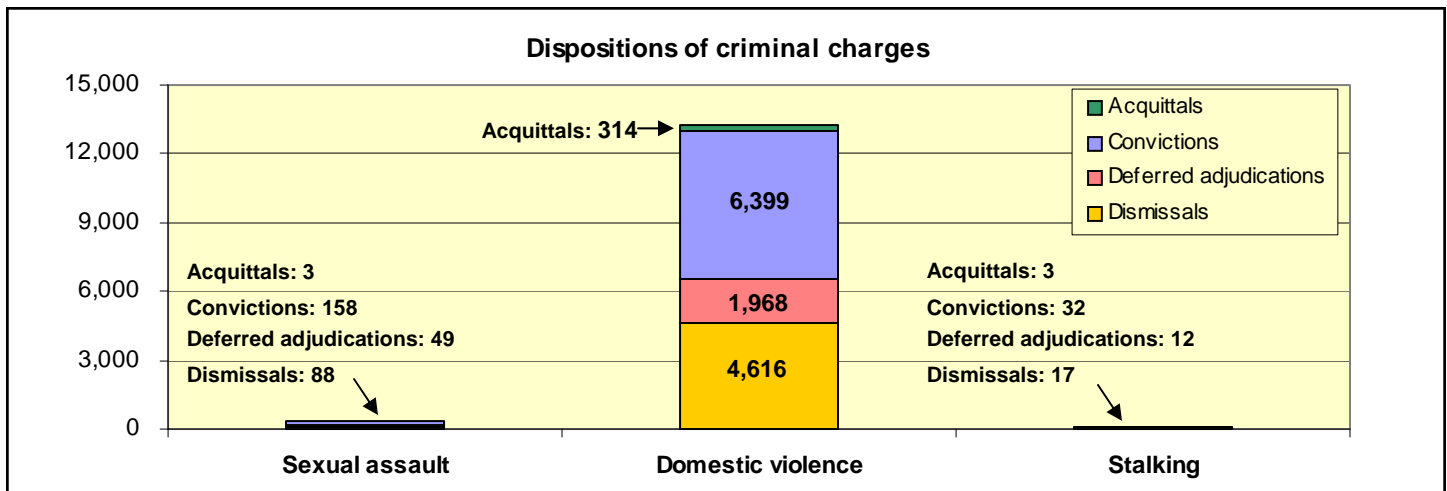
Courts

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Dispositions of violations of probation

Probation officers monitor offenders to review progress and compliance with court orders. The data reported below reflects the consequences imposed for violations that were disposed of during the current report period.

Violations of probation	Dispositions of violations
Protection orders (167)	53% (88) had partial or full revocation of probation 18% (30) had no action taken 16% (27) had conditions added 8% (13) received fine 5% (9) had verbal/written warning
New criminal behavior (247)	72% (179) had partial or full revocation of probation 13% (33) had conditions added 8% (19) had no action taken 4% (10) had verbal/written warning 2% (6) received fine
Failure to attend mandated offender treatment program (418)	49% (205) had partial or full revocation of probation 33% (137) received verbal/written warning 11% (47) had conditions added 6% (26) had no action taken 1% (3) received fine
Other condition of probation or parole (740)	78% (578) had partial or full revocation of probation 9% (69) received verbal/written warning 5% (37) had no action taken 4% (29) had conditions added 4% (27) received fine

Offender monitoring

- ◆ **5,016** offenders received **47,480** face-to-face monitoring contacts
- ◆ **2,638** offenders received **15,700** telephone monitoring contacts
- ◆ **1,109** offenders received **4,560** unscheduled surveillance contacts

In addition to offender monitoring, probation officers also contact victims as an additional strategy to increase victim safety

- ◆ **1,937** victims received **7,283** contacts
