



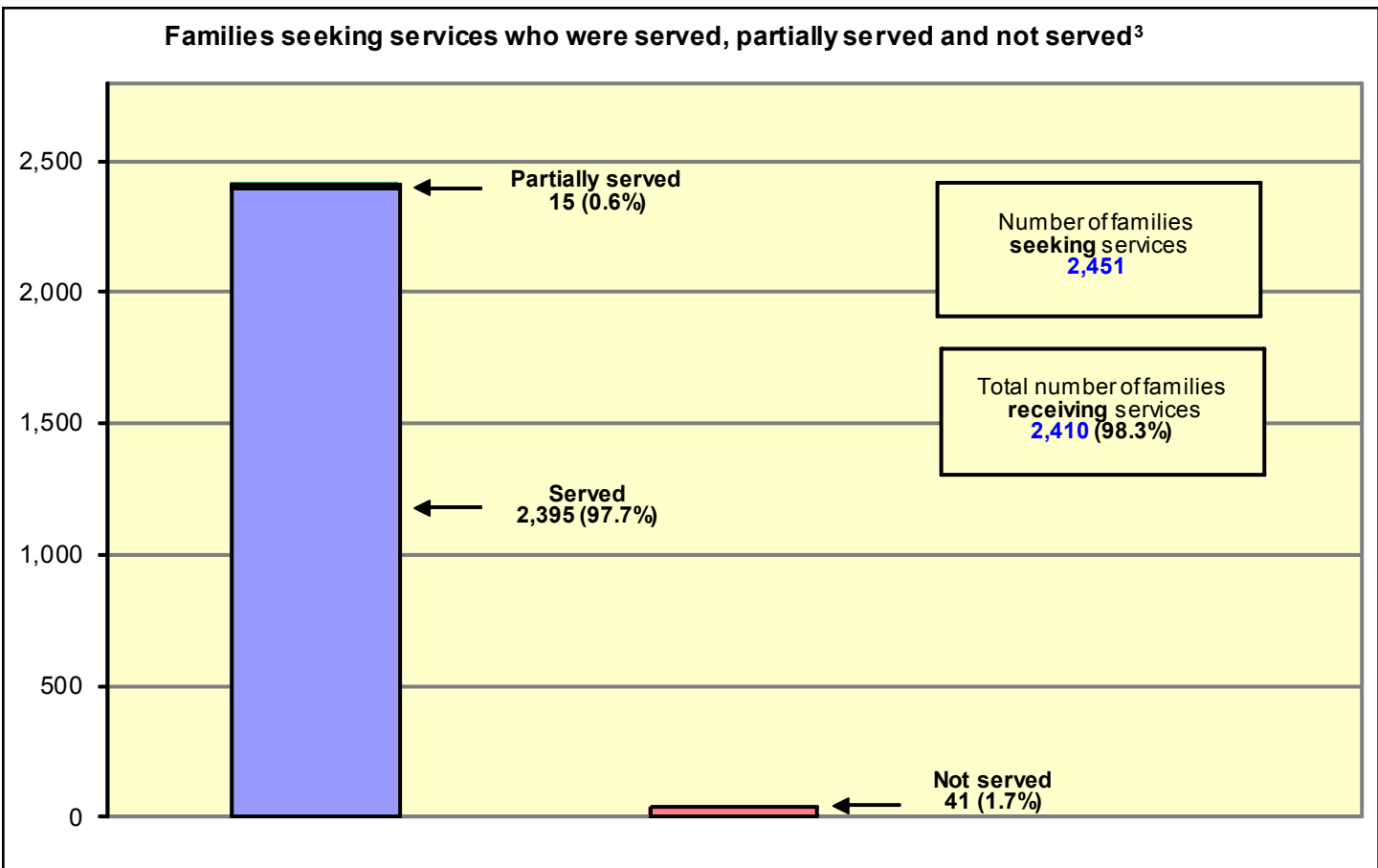
Safe Havens: Supervised Visitation and Safe Exchange Grant Program (Supervised Visitation Program)¹

The Supervised Visitation Program provides an opportunity for communities to support the supervised visitation and safe exchanges of children -by and between parents- in situations involving domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, child abuse, or stalking. This program funds jurisdictions which have implemented, or plan to implement, innovative programs to increase supervised visitation and exchange options for families with a history of domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, child abuse, or stalking.

Number of grantees reporting	86
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Services: Supervised Visitation Program grantees provided supervised visitation and safe exchange services to more than **2,400** families.

Number of grantees providing services to families: **47** (55% of all grantees reporting)²

Types of Services: Supervised Visitation Program grantees provide an array of services to families with a history of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, or child abuse. These services include: one-on-one supervised visits, group supervised visits, and supervised exchanges.

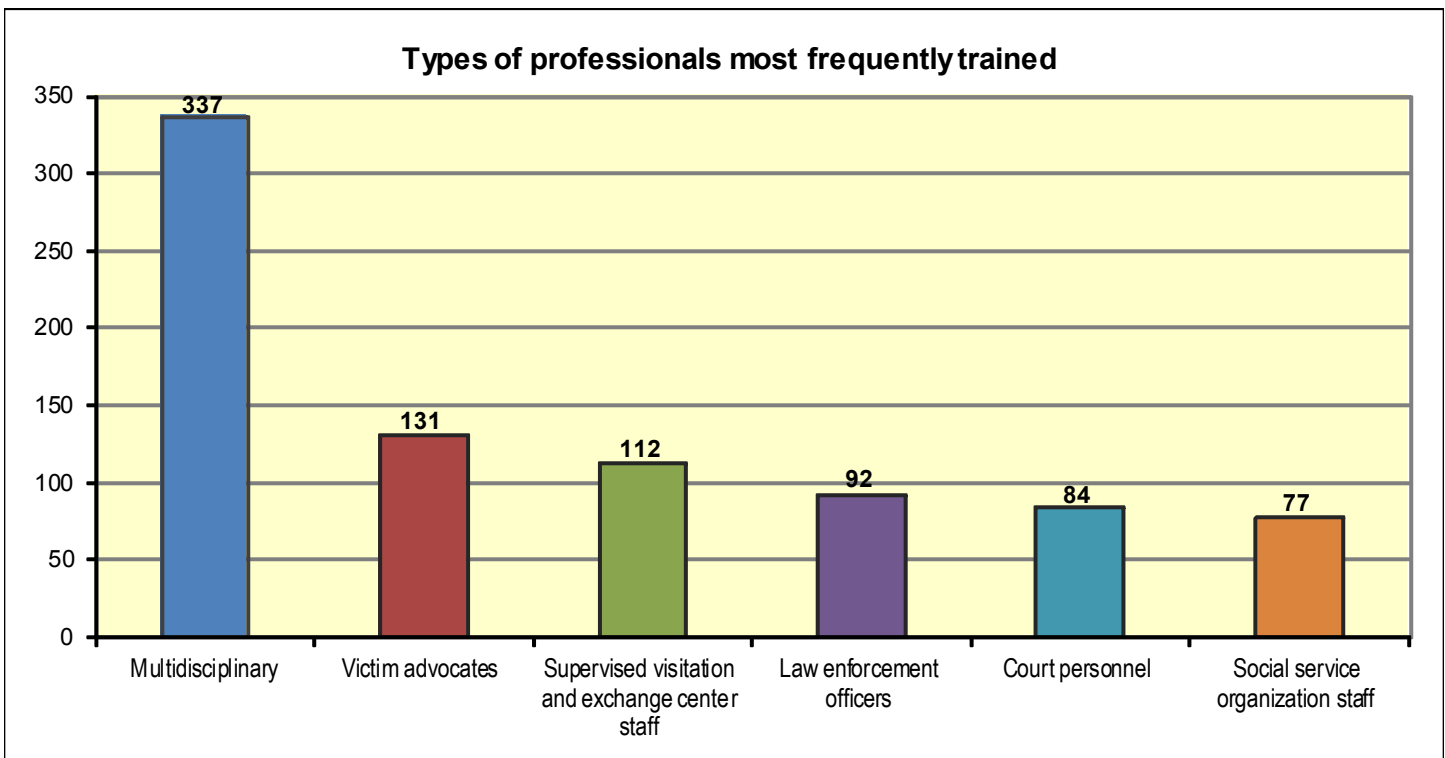

Training and Staff Development: Supervised Visitation Program grantees train professionals to improve the response to children and families with a history of sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, or child abuse.

Number of grantees using funds for training and/or staff development: **49** (57% of all grantees reporting)

Total number of people trained: **1,260**

Number of training events: **95**

Staff: Supervised Visitation Program staff provide supervised visitation and safe exchange of children, develop community advocacy committees, and establish statewide training and technical assistance projects to increase supervised visitation and safe exchange options.
