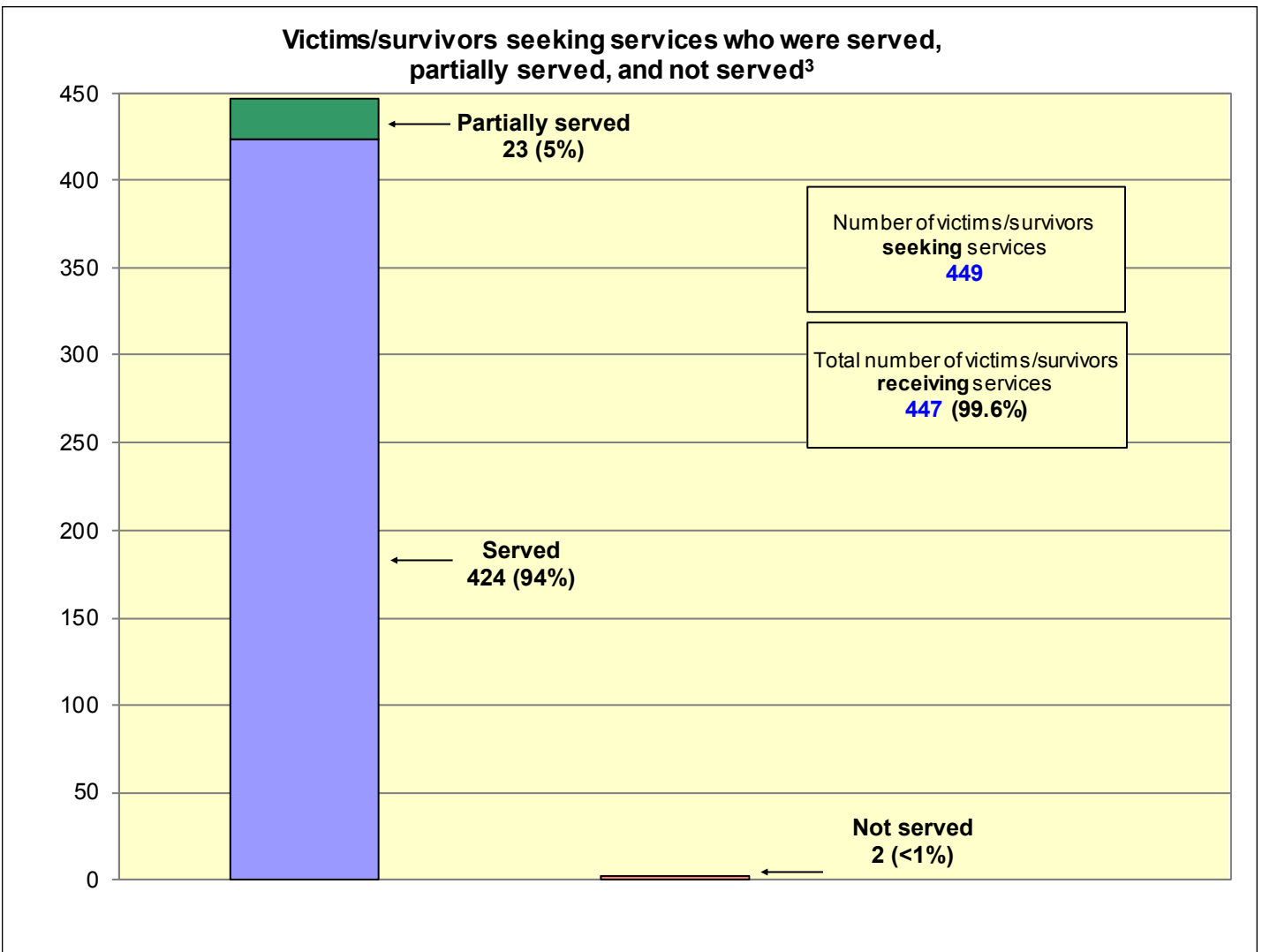




The purpose of the Tribal SASP Program is to support victims of sexual assault in tribal communities. Grantees create, maintain, and expand sustainable sexual assault services, which are uniquely situated to respond to the needs of sexual assault victims within tribal populations.

Number of grantees reporting	30
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Victim Services: Tribal SASP grantees provided services to **447** victims/survivors of sexual assault to help them become and remain safe from violence.

Victim services and demographics: Tribal SASP grantees provided an array of services to victims/survivors of sexual assault including victim advocacy (actions designed to help the victim/survivor obtain needed resources or services), counseling/support group, crisis intervention, and legal advocacy (assistance navigating the criminal and/or legal system). Victims/survivors receive safety planning, referrals, and information as needed.

Staff: Tribal SASP staff provide victim services and outreach to increase victim/survivor safety.
