- 2. If you receive funds for training, coordinated community response, victim services, and law enforcement, you would complete sections A1, A2, B, C1, C3, D, E1, and F (and answer "no" in subsections C2, C4-C8 and E2-E5).

The activities of volunteers or interns should be reported if they were coordinated or supervised by Rural Program-funded staff or if Rural Program funds substantially supported their activities.
